April 2013 Summary of Activity

Theft

A theft of a cattle gate was reported. No investigative leads.

Credit Card Fraud

A report of credit card fraud / identity theft was reported. Case is being investigated.

Criminal Damage

There were three reports of damage to property, with broken light fixtures, paint and oil thrown at homes. The offenders were subsequently arrested; case is pending a court appearance.

Several mailboxes were reported damaged. Case is being investigated.

Criminal Trespass to Property

The complainant reported that a vehicle drove onto his property posted no trespassing. The complainant did not wish to press charges, but wanted the offender warned. The officer spoke with the offender and issued the warning. No further action.

Runaway

A resident reported his child missing. The complainant advised they had an argument and the child did not come home after school. The complainant later reported the child returned home.

DUI

There were two arrests for driving under the influence which originated as cellular 911 calls.

No DL / Suspended / Revoked DL

No Valid Driver's License – 6 citations; Driving while License Suspended – 2 arrests.

Premise Check

Officers discovered four unsecured doors during residential house watches. The premises were checked for signs of burglary and secured. Key-holders were notified.

Civil Matters

A complainant contacted BHPD about the removal of belongings from his property. The complainant was advised he'd need to get clarification of the court order in order to go on the property.

A resident reported flooding on their property due to what they believed were modifications in topography on the neighboring properties. Photos were taken and the report was forwarded to the Village for follow-up.

A resident reported an item received on E-Bay was damaged. A report was generated for documentation only.

Vehicle Lock-outs

Five vehicle lockouts were reported. Entry was gained by the responding officer.

Alarms

Officers responded to one burglar alarm with an unsecured door. The premise was checked for signs of burglary and a key-holder was notified.

Burning Complaint

An officer responded to a burning complaint. The fire was extinguished. No further action taken.

Other Public Complaints

A complaint of trash left out by the driveway. The officer spoke with the homeowner who agreed to bring the trash in until garbage day.

Complaint was received that horses were not being cared for. Working with volunteers and the Department of Agriculture, some of the horses were removed for the property with the owner's permission.

Found Property

Found crate with items along a roadway was turned in. Owner was identified and the property was returned.

A street sign was located on the complainant's property. Arrangements were made to have the sign turned over to the Village.

While checking a vacant home, the officer found USC. It was turned over to investigations to log into property.

Citizen Assist

Old ammunition was turned in for destruction.

Identity Theft

Complainant advised that he had received an email from a police department in Wisconsin indicating that someone had obtained license plates under his name. An identity theft affidavit was completed. There was no monetary loss.

Task Force Activity

NIPAS EST was activated in Waukegan for an armed barricaded subject. The subject surrendered without incident.

Child Custody Exchange

Officers responded to five requests for a stand-by during a child custody exchange.

Animal Incidents

Four stray dogs were picked up. The owners were located and responded to BHPD to pick up the dogs. No further action taken.

Two stray dogs were picked up. The owners were not located; they were turned over to Strays Halfway House for adoption.

BHPD Officer Firing Weapon

An Officer responded to a report of injured wildlife used their duty weapon to terminate the suffering animal.

Target Permits

Two target permits were inspected and issued by the Range Officer.

Accidents

Officers responded to the following traffic crashes during the month:

- 16 – Property Damage
- 3 – Vehicle vs. Deer
- 1 – Injury crash

Dumping Complaints

Officers responded to two separate dumping complaints. Cases are being investigated.




On Saturday May 4, 2013 the Arlington Heights Police Department responded to a report of a man with a gun and shots being fired in our downtown business district. Information was received that a woman was inside a 6th floor condominium with her son. The son was despondent and threatening to take his life. The woman called 911 and said her son had a gun in his possession and had fired several shots inside the unit. The woman was able to flee the condominium and was taken into protective custody by officers, while her son remained inside the unit.

Due to a high volume of vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the downtown area, an ILEAS box alarm was activated to assist our Department.

The Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS) was activated. Officer Jeremy Hensler from your Department responded to assist. After numerous attempts to have the suspect exit the condo, NIPAS forced entry and the offender was taken into custody without further incident.

On behalf of the Arlington Heights Police Department I would like to take this opportunity to recognize your Officer for his professionalism and dedication to duty. While assisting our agency in this matter Officer Hensler's handling of the situation assured the safety of all personnel and they are to be commended.
